



Emerging Saddlemaker Preview Presented Pleasant Valley Saddle Shop

1st Place \$500, 2nd Place \$250, & 3rd Place \$200

The Emerging Saddlemakers Preview is conducted at the Southwest Leather Workers Trade Show in Prescott, AZ, each year. The purpose is to encourage new students of the saddlemaking arts to showcase their skills, recent accomplishments and to receive unbiased analysis and insights for improvement.

ESP SCORING 100 Points possible:

15 points -	Overall Appeal: Pleasing to the eye; creates desire to touch and feel outlines.
15 points -	Seat: Ground seat made for comfort; cantle properly contoured.
10 points -	Rigging: Properly set for lateral uniformity and safety.
15 points -	Construction: Safety first; consistent fit of all parts; uniform stitching.
30 points -	Consistency of lines: Seat covered smoothly, with no pockets or lumps; skirts and jockeys flow together with consistent lines, front to back; fenders match saddle type and are hung correctly.
10 points -	Finish: Edges smoothly polished. All leather surface polished with appealing luster (not overly waxed; no spray lacquer).

5 points - Decoration: Plain, border stamp, geometric, or floral.

Send in your entry right away (deadline: February 7, 2025). The show will be here faster than you think (Feb. 21-23). Make this the year you take a giant leap forward in your skills.

Basic Saddle Repair Part 2 (Western Saddles)

The focus of this workshop is to provide a solid foundation for anyone already repairing saddles and tack or contemplating doing it. Subject matter consists of identifying the parts of saddles and tack, the relationship each part plays, procedures necessary and suitable leather to repair each, materials, and supplies needed to do the job. In this workshop, you will build a beautiful pair of basic shotgun chaps, learning along the way all the essential construction skills and simple methods Julie has developed over 35 years of chap making. She will go over how to take measurements and use them to draft a custom pattern that fits, discussing also how to adjust future patterns you may need to draft for a wide variety of body shapes. 
